The Court: Well, Mr. Poluk, your lawyer has set forth your position very well, and I am certain Mr. Asselin would agree, and I am certain that the R.C.H.P.representative here would agree that this legislation leaves very much -- let's put it another way. This is very poor legislation under which we had to act. You can take it from me that I -- you might not know this, but you do know that I made a personal trip out to see you at the Correctional Institute, which is probably unusual for a Judge, but I was sufficiently worried about your case. I also must have spent six different phone calls with lawyers and legal representatives, and this was in an attempt to get as early a psychiatric examination as possible, and in an effert to get you into a hospital as soon as possible, because I would agree with your counsel that the legislation as drafted is completely unworkable. It is not only unworkable, but it is in competition with another branch of legislation, namely the Hospital Act, passed by the same Territorial Council, and I find it almost incomprehensible that the same people could pass two statutes which are not only in competition with each other and not work therefore, but can not be made in themselves to work within the physical situations of the-Northwest Territories. I could have expected that to happen from people in Ottawa, but when you have people living right here in Yellowknife passing this type of legislation, the very same people that complain about the fact that Ottawa doesn't understand local conditions I begin to wonder.

So, I am not going to let it stop there. I am going

to collect copies of the evidence in this case and I am going to send a very strongly worded recommendation that the legislation be looked at and reviewed and changed, and in the meantime it may not be worth anything but I am going to suggest to the Government they pay two hundred dollars to you by way of compensation, but I want to make it clear that I do not consider in any way that the police or the crown acted wrongly. They did everything within the limits of the legislation that they knew to save your life and to help you. It has turned out fortunately and I am very pleased, and I know you are, that you don't need to be incarcerated any more. I don't think I can say any more than that.
