

Transcript of the sentencing portion of the trial held before The Honourable Madame Justice M. M. Hetherington and jury, sitting in Pangnirtung, in the Northwest Territories, on the 24th day of April, A.D. 1996.

THE COURT: The accused, in this case, has
pled guilty to one charge of using a weapon in
committing an assault.

He has admitted that he got into an argument with the complainant about their son. During the course of that argument, he held a knife to various parts of her body and repeatedly threatened to kill her. The complainant must have been terrified by this experience. The complainant later went to the nursing station. The nurse who looked after her, Ms.

Magnusson, testified that the complainant had many superficial lacerations to various parts of her body including her face. Ms. Magnusson also observed bruising and abrasions in several areas.

The accused is 25 years old. He has a Grade 8 education. His employment record compares favorably with that of other men in this community. He spent two months at Arctic College where he took the Inshore Fisheries course. His instructor, during that course, has spoken well of him in a letter of reference which is marked as Exhibit 3 in this matter. The accused now has or has access to the equipment that he needs to pursue commercial fishing in this area.

Unfortunately, the accused has a record of prior criminal convictions which includes one conviction for assault and one for assault with a weapon. He was on judicial interim release when he committed the offense

with which I am concerned. Subsequently, he was 1 convicted of assault and sexual assault. His longest 2 previous sentence was three months. 3 I accept the submissions of Ms. Cooper to the 4 effect that the accused has spent three-and-a-half 5 months in custody in relation to the offense with which 6 I am concerned. It is, indeed, unfortunate that a 7 young man with the abilities which this accused has displayed has been so frequently before the courts. am particularly concerned, in this case, by the way in 10 which he used the weapon he chose and the number of 11 injuries inflicted even if, in the result, those 12 injuries were not serious. 13 Will you stand, Mr. Keyuajuk.
