Transcript of Reasons for Sentence delivered by The Honourable Justice J.Z. Vertes, sitting at Yellowknife, in the Northwest Territories, on Thursday, April 30, A.D. 1998.

THE COURT:

COURT: Kirk Douglas Minoza has entered a plea of guilty to a charge of break, enter and theft committed in Fort Providence on January 27, 1997. The facts reveal that on that date, the accused, in the company of another person, broke into a restaurant and stole some liquor and other items. The crime was quickly solved and the items recovered except for some of the liquor.

The accused is only 22 years old, but already he has a lengthy and serious related record. That record reveals offences both in Youth Court and Adult Court, and, by my count, there are seven offences in Adult Court alone since 1995. The most serious of those offences is a conviction for break, enter and theft in 1995 in which the accused received a 20-month sentence of imprisonment, although I am told the circumstances of that offence were somewhat more serious and different than the circumstances of this offence.

Counsel have made a joint submission for a sentence of imprisonment of 18 months. Based on everything that I have heard, it is clear to me that counsel recognize the principle of proportionality in formulating this joint submission. There is certainly nothing I have heard in the circumstance of this case that suggest to me that the joint submission is not a fit disposition. It is certainly within the appropriate range of sentences, and I think, in

circumstances such as this, a joint submission should 1 be, where possible, supported. 2 3 I have heard that the accused is perhaps now 4 coming to recognize that he has to change his way of life if he wishes to avoid even more serious 5 difficulties in the future. 6 Stand up, Mr. Minoza. Mr. Minoza, I am going to 8 accept the recommendation of your counsel and Crown counsel with respect to the sentence. I encourage you 9 to follow through on your good intentions of taking 10 11 counseling and other programs so that you can improve your education and outlook so that you can avoid coming 12 back to court. You are still young, you have many 13 years ahead of you. I am sure you can make those very 14 15 good years if you choose to do so. 16 I sentence you to serve a term of imprisonment of 17 18 months. The Warrant of Committal will be endorsed 18 with my recommendation that Mr. Minoza be given careful 19 consideration at an early date for appropriate 20 counseling programs. You may sit down. 21 Is there anything further we need to address, 22 Counsel? 23 MS. CHARBONNEAU: Not on this matter, My Lord. 24 MR. MAHAR: Thank you, sir. 25 THE COURT: Thank you for your submissions.
