MADAM CLERK: Ray Frederick Evans, you stand charged that on or about the 28th day of November, 1987, at or near the City of Yellowknife, in the Northwest Territories, did assault Alice Mary Sanderson, contrary to Section 245 of the Criminal Code.

THE COURT: Crown election?

MR. BRUSER: Summary, Your Honour?

THE COURT: Do you understand the charge against you, Mr. Evans?

THE ACCUSED: Yeah.

THE COURT: What do you wish to do about this charge?

THE ACCUSED: I'd like to plead guilty, but I'd like to explain a couple of things.

THE COURT: You sit down and I'll give you that opportunity.

You sit down, then, and the Crown attorney is going to tell me
what happened. You listen carefully to what he says.

MR. BRUSER: This involves a matrimonial dispute, Your Honour. It happened on the 28th of November. On that date, Your Honour, in the morning, the police went to the Yellowknife Hospital to talk to the victim, Alice Sanderson. She was noted to have dried blood around her right ear: she had a small cut to the cartilage area of it. There were also marks on the right side of her neck, which appeared to the police officer to be friction type marks. They talked with her. She then described an altercation she had had with Mr. Evans. She did not want the police to be contacted.

The police eventually learned, Your Honour, that what had occurred is that the two of them had had an argument that morning at around 5:00 a.m.; the argument escalated.

Mr. Evans is alleged to have grabbed her by the upper arms and then pushed her away from him. She was trying to follow him into the bathroom. When he pushed her, she fell against a door jamb. That's how she injured her ear, and that is how she bruised her right arm.

After he left the bathroom, he tried to leave the home, but it seems that he then grabbed her by the collar area and shook her, causing some friction marks to her neck. She says that she felt as though she were being choked.

Those are the alleged facts.

THE COURT: Mr. Evans, is what the Crown attorney told me true?

THE ACCUSED: Some are true, but I don't think some are.

THE COURT: Well, you stand up, please. You tellme what parts of it aren't true or that you don't agree with. Stand up, please.

THE ACCUSED: Well, when I went to, in the bathroom, she wouldn't

let me go there, so....

THE COURT: You said that?

THE ACCUSED: She -- I mean -- when I was going to the bathroom, she didn't want me to go there, and I didn't mean to hurt her, but I just pushed her away. I just wanted to go -- I really need to go to the bathroom, so I just pushed her away. I didn't want to hurt her; I just wanted to get in the bathroom. And then when I left, she kept bothering me, and I just was shaking her; I wasn't trying to hurt her or anything. And after that, I just -- I didn't want to hurt her -- so I just went up-town.

THE COURT: Well, I think that's what I understand the Crown

MR. BRUSER: On sentence....

Earlier or later? THE COURT:

That was a later date, Your Honour, in December. MR. BRUSER: There was alcohol involved, I am told. That's all I have to say.

THE COURT: All right, Mr. Evans. What do you want to say in your own behalf? Stand up, please.

THE ACCUSED: Just that -- like, I was, mentioned, like, I wasn't starting anything, like, for this, you know. Like, I was provoked until like, you know, she kept bothering me and that. And it wasn't my fault, like, you know; I didn't start anything.

THE COURT: How tall are you, Mr. Evans?

THE ACCUSED: About five-eleven.
