Transcript of the oral sentencing delivered by His Honour Chief Judge J.R. Slaven, sitting at Fort McPherson, in the Northwest Territories, Wednesday, May 11th, A.D. 1988.

I have before me Ronnie Pascal, who is nineteen and a half years of age. Leaving aside any liquor convictions, he has six convictions as a youth. He has had none as an adult. He would have been released from open custody on May 27th of 1987, and then committed the break and enterin August, within three months, and another break and enter in October, both of which were serious break and enters, and large amounts of cash were stolen. Some effort was required to get into the buildings and certainly to open the safe at N.C.P.C.

The young man says in the pre-sentence report that he drinks virtually every weekend for two to four days, and he has never earned money to buy liquor. He says it's given to him, but I don't believe that. It almost seems that he is pursuing a life of crime. One suspects he will be pursuing a life of crime to support his drinking habit. and could be compared to a heavy drug user in an American qhetto in large cities. I wish that in law I could send him to jail for six or twelve months. That is what these offences call for. But as a young offender I can't.

I am going to put him on suspended sentences on the break and enters and nothing else so that if he breaches his probation he can be brought back and sentenced on the two break and enters again. That is why I am directing the transcript of these reasons be given to the Crown and to the Police here in Fort McPherson. If I order community service work on those suspended sentences, would that vitiate

any later sentencing, Ms. Wall? Would it prevent it? 1 seems to me it's a sentence, isn't it? I think I will leave 2 it alone.

May I just have a moment, Your Honour. MS. WALL:

THE COURT: I will proceed with the utmost caution.

MS. WALL: If he is fined, that's a sentence, Your Honour.

I know if he's fined that's a sentence.

THE COURT: Yes. Well, I'm not going to touch it. I want to be able to sentence him on the break and enters if he fouls up.

Would you stand up, please, Mr. Pascal. the reasons I have given, I convict you on the two break and enters, suspend the passing of sentence, place you on probation for a period of two years to keep the peace and be of good behaviour. I was thinking of making a condition that you not drink, but I won't make it that tough on you. But I want to tell you that if you break the law again, you will be brought back and sentenced for these break and enters, and if I am doing the sentencing, I assure you you're going to jail for six months or a year for these B & E's, together with whatever new stuff you bring in when you're back. you're going for two years. You've got two strikes. better not take that third swing. On the possession of stolen property, I will convict you. Is there a Fine Options Program here, Ms. Blake?

MS. BLAKE: Yes, there is, Your Honour.

THE COURT: The maximum is up to a thousand dollars, is it?

So, some gentleman goes out and works hard in the winter to catch some fish in the cold and in the discomfort. How old is Andre Neyando?

MS. BLAKE: He's in his sixties.

THE COURT: A man in his sixties goes out in the cold to catch fish, I don't know if he wants to sell it or keep it for his family, and you, a young do-nothing, at your age, come and steal that elderly gentleman's fish. I hope you're proud of that. I convict you as charged and direct you pay a fine of Nine hundred and ninety-nine dollars. That is so you can work it off by fine option, if you so choose. In default of payment, two month's imprisonment. I give you eight months within which to pay that fine. I direct you be held here in custody until the probation order has been prepared and you have signed it. I guess, then, there is still one outstanding information that was remaining.

MS. WALL: Yes. I would like to stay proceedings on that, Your Honour.

THE COURT: Thank you.
