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THE COURT: K.A. comes before the Court admitting that he damaged property in August, 1985, that is almost seven months ago, when he was entering the property and kicked the door in because he was looking for something to sniff or to drink.

He did damage to property at that time and is guilty of mischief. He also admits that on the 12th day of August, 1985, just about six days after the other offence he broke and entered a residence and took some liquor on that occasion, knowing that the house had been broken into earlier. But by entering and taking two bottles of liquor he violated the break and enter charge under the Code.

Although he is now eighteen years of age, the offences occurred when he was still under eighteen, and, therefore, is subject to the rules of the Youth Court and the Young Offenders Act. He is entitled to be treated on this occasion as a young offender, even though he had previously been dealt with as an adult.

I have heard submissions by counsel, and it is suggested that these offences are serious enough to justify jail terms or incarceration of some type or another, because he had been involved with offences in the past and has been in jail. But I have reviewed, as well, the pre-disposition report which indicates that Mr. A, is a polite, cooperative young man who is sorry now and shows remorse for having committed the offences. The report indicates that he intended to return to school, although his attendance has not been very good in the past year that he had been there. He comes from

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a stable family. While he was a student he was considered to be a smart person, a bright young man, outgoing, industrious and willing to make efforts. He was in grade nine until recently.

Some of the people in the community have indicated that maybe he should stay in the community and do community service work and supervise school grounds and be responsible for helping other people not to get in trouble. He has good health, but seems to be sometimes swayed by his peers, which means that he follows what other people are doing, even if it's not within the law.

On this occasion I am going to give him the benefit of being before the Youth Court, and instead of requiring custody I am going to place him on probation. The period will be for nine months. I will require that he report to the Youth Court Worker when and as directed. I am going to require that he attend school regularly, and that means that he has the responsibility of attending school at all times unless he has a good excuse, and if he does not attend he will have to be called back to the Court to be dealt with.

On the two charges I am going to make a total for community service work to be done, and I am recognizing that both of these offences are not the most serious in the category but still deserve some substantial work, because the young man certainly should have known that he shouldn't cause damage or mischief and should not have broken and entered. I am going to require that he perform one hundred hours of

community service work as and when directed by the Youth Court Worker. That will mean that if there is any work that can be available to be done that Mr. A. will have to do it, and if he fails to do it upon the request of the Youth Court Worker, he will also be reported and have to come back to the Court. Mr. A., do you understand all that?

MR. A.: Yes.

THE COURT: And you're agreeable to perform the community service work and keep out of trouble, are you?

MR. A.: Yes.

THE COURT: All right. The Clerk will be preparing your probation order, and you will be required to sign it before you leave here as well today.
