THE COURT: Well, it is so hard for me to understand the attack on a poor old eighty-one year old gentleman who was minding his own business and at home at four-thirty in the morning, and this young drunk arrives and beats the heck out of him, a terrible thing. I would have no hesitation whatsoever in sending him to jail but for the fact that this is the first offence he apparently has ever committed. But then things seem to have gone down hill with him since then. was awaiting the determination of this matter and he gets in further trouble and is convicted of mischief and breach of an undertaking. It must have been a fairly serious mischief offence when as a first offender he was fined a total of Four hundred dollars in J.P. Court at that time. He was placed on probation, again still awaiting the determination of the assault matters, and he goes on with this foolishness with the firearm.

At Fort Good Hope, a young man with a good job and making good money, and I know liquor befuddled him. It is hard to know what was in his mind to cause him to act that way even though he was drunk. A terrible thing. I don't think it's a matter of rehabilitating him. It's a matter of deterring him from drinking. I'm not going to make any probation order. Surely the discipline of work is worth something, and if he wants to get counselling and treatment for his alcohol problem, that's up to him to get it. It won't be by my order. He's got to make his own decisions.
