Transcript of the Oral Sentencing delivered by His Honour Judge R. M. Bourassa, sitting at Yellowknife, in the Northwest Territories, on Friday, December 9, A.D. 1983.

THE COURT: The regulations that businessmen have to operate under sometimes become pots of spaghetti in terms of finding an end to them, and it's amazing that here in Yellowknife where the cost of living is thirty percent more than in Edmonton, and this Defendant is charging ten dollars a hundred weight and licenced carriers are charging fifty to eighty percent more. People who want to truck produce into Yellowknife should be encouraged. From the Ordinance, it would appear that obtaining a certificate is a very simple, straightfoward thing, but I am familiar with some of the procedures that have to be followed in other jurisdictions and it becomes very, very difficult, very time-consuming, and very difficult to obtain a permit to truck anything anywhere.

I think it is important in sentencing to determine if the accused is operating out of total frustration with the snowfall of regulations or if he is just deliberately ignoring a very straightforward, simple exercise.

I take into account that it would appear from the Ordinance that obtaining a certificate borders on a matter of right, and as well that the Defendant has as of this late date in any event applied for a certificate.

In imposing sentence, I note it is a summary conviction matter punishable by a maximum five hundred dollar fine or six months imprisonment, or both, and that that maximum is reserved for the worst example of this offence. I take into account the accused has been convicted of a similar

offence in another jurisdiction in the past in imposing sentence in this instance. Mr. Yaceko, would you stand up, please? On this charge, I'm going to impose a fine of three hundred and fifty dollars, in default thirty days in jail. Do you require time to pay the fine? THE ACCUSED: No, I can pay it Monday morning. Well, that is time. I have to give you four-THE COURT: teen days. 9 THE ACCUSED: Thank you, Your Honour. 10 That is fourteen days to pay the fine. THE COURT: 11 Your Honour, I would ask that you order that MS BOILLAT: 12 the exhibits be returned to the accused. 13 THE COURT: I have no exhibits. 14 We're willing at this time to waive the appeal MS BOILLAT: 15 The truck has been seized by the police, and they period. 16 require authority to return it. 17 Well, on Crown undertaking and upon a waiver THE COURT: 18 of the appeal period, I will direct any exhibits seized 19 in the investigation of this matter be returned to Mr. 20 Yaceko forthwith. 21 MS BOILLAT: Thank you, Your Honour.
