Transcript of the sentencing delivered by His Honour Judge R. M. Bourassa sitting at Fort Good Hope, Northwest Territories, on Wednesday, May 25, A.D. 1983

THE COURT: Leonard Masuzumi is convicted of an offence of breach of probation which is now, I understand, the fifth time he has been convicted of breach of probation.

A probation order, as I am sure Mr. Masuzumi understands, is in a sense the giving of a promise to the Court that he will stay out of trouble. Everybody is supposed to do that, but Mr. Masuzumi has made a special promise to the Court that he would do that, and it is obvious to me from his past record and what is here that his word is no good.

I do not know what it is that propells Mr. Masuzumi to get into trouble, but the only thing the Court can do is put Mr. Masuzumi in gaol for longer and longer and longer and longer periods of time until he understands he has to live up to his promises and live up to the responsibilities we all have in a community, and that is to keep the peace.

This kind of offence normally carries with it, on conviction, extensive periods of gaol up to a maximum of six months. You have already served time for breach of probation, and the only thing the Court can do is keep giving you longer sentences until at some point in time you understand the consequences of fighting and getting into trouble and walking around with knives.

I am a little reluctant to do that, but it would appear you have given the Court no other choice, and you are asking the Court to be sent to gaol. That is the only conclusion the Court can arrive at when you breach your



probation so soon after being put on an order, and almost for the same kind of thing that got you in trouble in the past; that is, carrying weapons around.

Taking into account the facts that have been given to me by the Crown, and those are the only facts before me which indicate, in my estimation, a minimal breach of a probation order in terms of breaching the peace, I have no details of the fight or who was injured or what happened in the fight, just that there was an altercation, and Mr. Masuzumi disappeared and was arrested.

On that basis and taking into account the fact it would appear from submissions from counsel that Mr. Masuzumi has responded to part of the probation order for which he is convicted of breaching today by performing the community service and paying the fine, I am not going to send Mr. Masuzumi to gaol for an extensive period of time, I suppose as a last warning to Mr. Masuzumi.

Mr. Masuzumi, you probably have been to Court enough times that you know that this girl over here is taking everything down that I say and everything the Crown Attorney said and your lawyer said today; and I want to make sure that she takes down that the Court has gone as far as it can. If you do not obey or live up to your promises to the Court, you are going to have to go to gaol for long periods of time, and it is not the Court that will be putting you in gaol, it will be you, yourself. You have to behave to stay out of gaol.



I am going to impose a term of one day in gaol which is served by you being in Court today.

In addition to that, I am going to put you on probation and direct you perform 200 hours of community service work. You will be on probation for three months, and that community service work is to be done within two months. You are to report forthwith to the probation officer here in Fort Good Hope, and you are to perform that work under their direction and to their complete satisfaction.

I want to point out to you, Mr. Masuzumi, that if you breach this probation order or if you are in trouble again, the Crown Attorney will be able to get a copy of my warning to you today from this lady that is taking this down, and that will be available to the next Judge who comes here, and it will be clear to the next Judge that you have been given every possible chance to keep you out of gaol. You will have to wait and sign the probation order, Mr. Masuzumi.
