THE COURT:

three charges before the Court. The charge under Section 236 of the Code, which is a violation of the lawful limit in alcohol consumption, shows that he was driving a motor vehicle on the nineteenth of January when the readings on the breathalyzer were two hundred and sixty milligrams in a hundred milliliters of blood, which is considered to be a relatively high reading.

On that occasion, the accused had taken a motor vehicle without permission and has pleaded guilty to that charge under Section 295 of the Criminal Code, when he took an unattended motor vehicle that was running while parked in front of a hotel and drove it and was then found to be in the vehicle while intoxicated.

He also has pleaded guilty to failing to appear as required in answer to an Appearance Notice.

Mr. Selamio has accummulated a substantial record and has spent quite some period of time in jail over the past number of years. He also has acknowledged receipt of the Notice of Intention to apply for an increased penalty under the breathalyzer offence since he had been convicted of similar offences in the past.

With regard to the breathalyzer, therefore, I have no alternative but to impose a jail term on the accused and I will impose the minimum term required under the Act of fourteen days.



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With regard to the taking of the motor vehicle without consent on the same occasion, I will also impose a term in jail because it appears that I have no other alternative but to turn to jail terms on these offences and impose a further fourteen days.

And with regard to his failure to appear in Court when summonsed to do so, I will impose a further five days in jail, all to run consecutively.

Do you understand all that, Mr. Selamio?

THE ACCUSED:

Yes, sir.

MR. GATES:

Sir, a total sentence of a month?

THE COURT:

Pardon?

MR. GATES:

Fourteen days, plus fourteen days, plus five

days?

THE COURT:

Yes, that's...
