In the matter of Leslie Thank you, sir. SHARKEY: and Tomasie Panipak, an action on behalf of the Applicant, Leslie, pursuant to the Reciprocal Enforcement of Maintenance Orders Act, I appear for the Respondent, Tomasie Panipak, who The Applicant lives in Ontario. As you can see, is present. the order made by Judge Geiger of the County Court, Family Court from Ontario makes a total figure of Nine hundred dollars for Mr. Tomasie Panipak advises me that his take-home pay is different than that estimated by his wife in the transcript in Ontario. He is employed here as an apprentice mechanic with the hamlet. He tells me he takes home approximately Sixteen hundred dollars a month, and that after his expenses he has between Eight and Nine hundred dollars, closer to Nine, actually, and that the other money he has is an amount -- so that he would be willing to make payments, should the Applicant consent for the purpose of this hearing, in the sum of Four hundred and twenty-five per month for the three. That would leave him with almost Five hundred. As you know, if anyone wants to take a vacation here it's very expensive to leave to There are all sorts of Clothing is expensive. travel south. miscellaneous expenses; gasoline, which I have not included in his fixed costs of food and housing and utilities.

That's our position, sir, is that the Nine hundred order is—it will always be said on behalf of a Respondent that the defence says that the order is too high, but in this case our position is that a Nine hundred dollar order is grossly inappropriate, and I say that with respect

to the Judge who made the order. He only had so much--He has to go simply on what is before him, and he's 2 going to error on the high side, he's going to error--I don't know, Mr. Humphries. You're an agent for the agent of the lady involved, are you? 5 That's correct, Your Honour. MR. HUMPHRIES: Have you authority to make a deal like this, or THE COURT: 7 must I listen to sworn evidence from the--8 MR. HUMPHRIES: I hesitate to call it a deal, Your Honour, but +-9 Well, I'm sorry. I shouldn't use the word deal. THE COURT: 10 I do have authority to have a discussion with MR. HUMPHRIES: 11 Mr. Sharkey, which I have done, and come to an agreement. THE COURT: Very well. With agreement of the Respondent, Mr. Panipak, and both counsel I order that Tomasie Panipak-or I confirm the order of Judge L.S. Geiger, having varied it for payments totalling Four hundred and twenty-five dollars a month, being One hundred and fifty dollars per month for each of the two children, Scirish Nutagaq and Keiko Koagaq, and in the sum of One hundred and twenty-five dollars per month for the Applicant, Leslie Panipak. Those payments are to be made to the Territorial Court, Courthouse, Yellowknife, Box 550 for forwarding to the appropriate Court in Ontario.

Now, it's very important, Mr. Panipak, that you make the payments by certified cheque or money order to the Yellowknife Court so then there is never any argument between you and your wife as to how much has been paid and how much hasn't been paid. Our Court will send it to the Court in Ontario, and it will eventually get to her. They are to be made on the first day of each month. Is that as good a day of the month as any, Mr. Sharkey?

We prefer the middle of the month, sir. MR. SHARKEY:

All right. On or before the 15th day of each THE COURT: month commencing the 15th of July, 1986.

Thank you, sir, I wonder if in due course my MR. SHARKEY: office could get a copy of the order, and I will undertake to forward it on to Mr. Panipak.

MR. SHARKEY: Thank you. I would ask, as well, simply as a matter of course and for the record that you address my client and make sure for the record he understands that. I do that as a matter of course in these types of cases.

Very well. Mr. Panipak, the Judge in Ontario THE COURT: said you should pay Nine hundred a month for the two children and your wife, but it is agreed by all of us here that considering how much you make and how much you take home a fair figure would be Four hundred and twenty-five dollars a month. It will all go to your wife, but it is to be One hundred and fifty for each child and One hundred and twenty-five for her. And this will continue until--if you lose your job or something, you have no income, you can go back to the Court and ask for it to be reduced, or she might come some time and ask it to be increased later, and you would have to come back to Court. When the children reach the age of eighteen, I think it is, you wouldn't have to pay for them any more. But for the time being you are to send those payments. Can you give him an envelope, Madam Clerk, a couple of envelopes.

THE CLERK: Yes, sir.

THE COURT: To the Territorial Court in Yellowknife to reach there on or before the 15th day of each month, and they will be forwarded on to Ontario for the benefit of your wife and children.
