## CLAUDE JEROME HARRY

Transcript of Sentence given by The Honourable Judge R.M. Bourassa sitting at Inuvik, Northwest Territories on the 2nd day of May, A.D. 2002.

(Charged under Section 348(1)(b) of the Criminal Code)

THE COURT: Thank you, Mr. Boyd. The accused have been found guilty of a break and enter and commit assault. It is an indictable offense, and a serious offense.

This is not a case of self-defense or protection of another. What motivated Claude Harry was clearly retaliation. His drunken common-law was pushed, and, as a result of being pushed and the drunkenness, fell down. He took great exception to that, and reacted violently.

I have no doubt that the consumption of liquor contributed to his conduct.

The accused, Claude Harry, has a long criminal record going back to 1990, including eight prior convictions for assaults, as recently as February, 2000. He has received one year imprisonment for assaults on his spouse, and has nonstop convictions for assaults in the past. He also has convictions for failure to comply with court orders, offenses involving consumption of alcohol and drugs.

There is no remorse. The victim was thoroughly beaten and knocked down. I don't think I can say anything to Mr. Harry that has not already been said.

Stand up please, Mr. Harry. Anything you want to say?

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CLAUDE HARRY: Nothing. No, I don't. I am sorry for what I did, and I was intoxicated, mind my own business, anyways, just mind my own business.

That's all I have to say.

THE COURT: One year. With respect to Claude (sic) Harry, he has a criminal record going back to 1977, and then no other convictions from 1978 to the year 2000. He was convicted of failure to comply with a probation order.

I find that peculiar. There must be some offense missing there, because obviously to be on probation and was on probation in the year 2000, and a probation order doesn't run from 1978 to 2000. There is a conviction missing there, but I don't know what it is.

Harold Harry, in my view, played a lesser role. He was drunk, and went to help his brother. That doesn't condone or ameliorate his conduct in any way. In fact, getting involved in a fight like this as a third man in is aggravating, even in hockey.

The big difference between Harold Harry and Claude Harry is the criminal record. Claude Harry has, as I have already indicated, nonstop convictions for assaults, and that is not the same thing for Harold.

Stand up, Harold. Anything you want to say?

HAROLD HARRY: No, sir.

THE COURT: There will be a term of imprisonment of one day, together with probation for nine months.

You are to keep the peace and be of good behavior.

You are not to be within the building known as

Sydney Apartments. You are not to be in the Sydney

Apartments for any circumstances, do you understand?

You are to pay \$500 by way of restitution or compensation to the clerk of the court for payment to Mr. Podzadny, and that is to be done within five months.

As I pointed out to you, Mr. Harry, the only difference between you and your brother is that you don't have a criminal record like he does. You get convicted of more assaults, and you will be getting jail sentences like he does. Do you understand that?

HAROLD HARRY: Yes, sir.

THE COURT: Okay. Watch your drinking. It would not have happened if you had not been drinking.
